My dear Phyllis

I am feeling a bit guilty about not writing to you more often. But I am glad you got my last letter.

I have been called by Mahomedy & Manjers for an interview. They want an article clerk. The interview is for the 28. I applied for relaxation of my banning order but the scribes have not yet replied.

Murkiner rang on Monday and called me for an interview on 3 July. I have applied to the magistrate. Something may click soon.

I received some letters of solidarity from overseas, mainly from West Germans. A few days ago I received one from West-Berlin signed by 23 "young people". It has, attached to it, a Picasso card showing a man behind bars and a peace dove outside. All very inspiring.

I had applied to go to the Gray Street mosque for Friday prayers and to visit my dad's grave in Brook Street. Permission was refused. They also refused me permission to visit my paralysed uncle in Chatsworth.

Its amazing how they live in fear. When

I apply for relaxation they come running home and interrogate me about it. And when they grant me permission, I must leave the area not before a certain time, take the shortest route possible, and come back by the same route and be back in my area before a certain time etc etc. One would think that by my going into town the whole state would collapse! I have never seen a bunch of more scared lot of people.

On the day of my release I was escorted home by Capt. Benjamin and Lt. Moody. The Captain was attempting to threaten me by saying that I should not apply for any relaxation for it would not be granted, and they are going to rule for the next 50 years! It was very amusing to find your own people speak to you like that. And they are so hostile. Another white Lt. came to take photographs and he was very polite - although no sweeter so - in marked contrast to our own blacks.

I think that is what's dominating white politics - and that of their blacks

puppets - it is fear, fear, fear. And in this fear we see the reflection of the strength of the liberatory movement of our country.

I see the B.C.M. is regrouping itself abroad. The former American lackeys - the P.A.C. chaps - are killing each other. The Imperialist one busy building up the B.C.M. and hope they will challenge our leadership among the masses. But they'll feel like the alphas before them.

What's going on your end. Are you working for the Basotho government? Still unsettled?
