Dear George and Maggie,

I'm sorry there wasn't time to talk about Agnes Nododile at the CRL meeting. I wanted to tell you I had met her a couple of times and also been on the phone (at her "madam's place") several times. I've been helping to sort out her affairs at Barclays Bank and the UIF (Labour dept., now Manpower Utilisation).

It was a pity you were unable to write her/inform her at the time you had the bright idea she should close that Barclays a/c. When I heard you had not done what you intended, I contacted her with this advice. In the event, she delayed and Cromwell died before she could do this. We went to the Bank, I phoned the Master of the Supreme Court, the Administration Board officials, etc. The long and short of it was she had to go twice to Observatory to satisfy officials there about the extent of Cromwell's estate and who his heirs might be. Eventually the money in the savings a/c at Barclays has been paid over to her.

You will remember you were going to send Peter Brown a note of who contributed what, following his appeal. I urged her to leave Barclays and put that amount in the NBS card savings a/c we opened for her recently, and she will do this. She has been paid out by Barclays. What gets me down is that neither she nor Cromwell realised how much had come in from Peter's appeal. Now she knows.

I am getting forms signed up by Agnes and by the last firm Cromwell worked for, as there is a little money left in Unemployment Insurance she should get (apparently). I have found a friend on the "coloured" staff at the Labour dept., which is nice.

Dear George, please don't think I am pushing, but could you possibly make a list of the names and amounts, and I will inform Agnes and Peter, just to make sure.
