
I have written to MD and have set in motion talks at least on the welfare of our children. This is my immediate concern and in fact my only concern.

Dear Pat, re: Law Reports - M. D. Randoe

In 1967 Speedy Printers bound Mrs Law reports at a cost of £115.00 or thereabouts.

These had loaned to Bhenpu Mahabier & Co and were put to the ordinary uses that such reports are put to.

When Bhenpu left and I was employed with Mrs Kali & Co I brought them with me. They are now housed on the 6th Floor Edson House.

Randy had cause to refer to a Law Report and needed the whole report concerning that case.

On the 3rd August I showed Mr. Randoe of Speedy Printers, Binn Eborard St, and complained of this. He referred me to Mr. Woodley. Mr. M. suggested that the books had been used carelessly & vehemently denied this - for all the books bound by Speedy would come apart due to bad book-binding. He promised to come over & see them.

After Randy's phone calls he called on the 7th August & showed him Law reports that had been bound by Mr. Mahabier of Pyramid Book binders. He made excuses that he did not have proper binding facilities for such reports & promised to get hold of Mr. Mahabier to arrive at a figure at which they would be re-bound. He promised to ring back after such consultation.

On the 22nd August, 1970 I rang him & he said he had consulted with Mr. Randoe

and they had decided that the materials used were better used in Summer & better results would ensue if they were rebound in the Summer months. I asked whether Mr. Mahabier had been consulted - NO. He said he would - but I should wait for the Summer months.

I spoke to Mr. Mahabier - he said it was utter nonsense that binding should only be done in Summer & referred me to some volumes he had done in the Winter months.

I wonder if you would rip them as it would put them on their toes. They haven't the material - or the know how - for some volumes are badly & incorrectly bound.

Mr. Mahabier for in the meantime agreed to bind them for Rs. 50 a volume, & to correct the pages etc. etc. There are some volumes for 1947 - 1962 (2)

i.e. 82 volumes.

The usual binding rate is Rs. 50 & you will agree at this figure it is very reasonable.

I shall be deeply grateful for your assistance in this regard.
