I live in London and work in an office which deals with exams. I am on the administrative staff. I'm not married, though hope one day I may be.

There is always a lot happening in London. At present the treasures from the tomb of the Egyptian pharaoh Tutankhamun are at the British museum, and most people seem interested and want to go to see them - people one would not expect to be interested in archaeological finds. I hope to go soon but believe one has to queue for hours.

I am spending this week-end with my mother (a widow) at her home in a country

village about sixty miles west of London.
This ^{time} is the middle of the English spring
with fresh green buds on the trees and
hedges, and lovely colourful blossom.

I hope very much you are
admitted as an attorney without any
complications. And I shall be thinking
of you all on 23rd when your husband is
due to return.

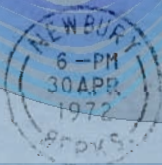
