



TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN

This is to certify that I have been attending Mrs. Phyllis Naidoo.

In July, 1979 Mrs. Naidoo was the victim of a parcel bomb explosion at her flat. She sustained severe injuries from shrapnel which was embedded over a wide area of her body. At the same time she sustained a laceration of her ear drum. Mrs. Naidoo was admitted to Queen Elizabeth II Hospital for emergency treatment and was later transferred to Europe where an ear drum was grafted.

In 1980 she was admitted to St. Joseph's Hospital where more pieces were removed from her body.

There are still two known pieces remaining but the surgeon both at Queen Elizabeth II and St. Josephs are reluctant to remove them.

At the beginning of 1982 Mrs. Naidoo started suffering from severe headaches with other neurological symptoms. She has been seen by the surgeon in Queen Elizabeth II together with myself and to date the cause has not been established.

I feel that Mrs. Naidoo should be referred to a neuro-surgeon or another physician to be assessed more fully and given appropriate treatment. This maybe related to the ruptured ear drum she sustained.

I recommend that Mrs. Naidoo be allowed to travel abroad for urgent and essential medical care.
