SUBJECT: Employment Opportunities - Indian Graduates - Survey

(1) It is essential at this stage to decide finally the material that is to be used, and the separate chapters, of the Survey, their order, etc., under the four Sections, A, B, C, and D, as given in the revised Table of Contents.

(2) In this memo., I propose to refer to this Table of Contents. I have collected into separate folders all the material relative to each of the Chapters, by taking out of the Draft Report the respective Chapters, and adding to them any written material I have done myself, and the written material of various members of the staff. I add that I have studied the criticisms of members of the staff of the Draft Report.

(3) Contents Table: This begins with a preface. What is the preface to be? *(Rector's Remarks)*

It passes to Section A: Background.

Chapter I: Introduction - The Aim and Scope of the Study. *Correct.*

I have collected into a folder what I have already written on this, plus the material, handwritten, headed Chapter I, provided by the Rector which is a resumé of the Rector's "case" for the extension of University Education to Indians, etc., plus 3 pages of typed material headed "Introduction" supplied by the Rector, plus a table of enrolments 1961-1962 and students graduating in 1963.

(5) There is no point in my making the necessary corrections to my material (corrections suggested by various members of the staff) until the questions are decided.

(6) Chapter 2: The Indian Community in the National Framework: This is fairly straight-forward, and I have already worked on its sections, taking the material from the Draft Report. I notice that in the criticisms of the Draft Report Professor Behr considers that Chapter 6 should follow ~~the~~ Chapter 3, that is, the Chapter on the Political and Legal Framework should be brought forward and included in the same section as the chapter on The Social and Economic Framework. This is in accordance with the Revised Table of Contents, and I have therefore made this change.

The historical part only should be brought forward otherwise there will be no "body" in the chapter dealing with the survey.

This Chapter the Indian Community in the National Framework consists of four parts: (a) Historical background; ✓ (b) Geographical Distribution; ✓ (c) Vocational Distribution; and the Political and Legal Framework; (d) Social and Economic Framework.

I call your attention to (c) Vocational Distribution:

Vocational Distribution does not seem to have been given any study other than the ~~graphs~~ diagrams supplied and attached to the memorandum on the establishment of a Department of Engineering. I need direction on the material to be used under the heading "Vocational Distribution". As far as the Political and Legal Framework is concerned the material is available.

(7) Section B: In the Contents Table the title of this section is "Employment or Vocational Pattern."

This forms Chapter 3 on the Contents Table, and is subdivided into Present Position; Primary Industries; Secondary Industries; Tertiary Industries, each of these sub-divided.

Are we right in giving this section the title: Employment or Vocational Pattern?

In the Report there is very little reference to the "Present Position".

Should not the title of this section be THE MAIN SURVEY, or something more appropriate to the Contents of this Section.

In the Report this Section deals with the Survey actually undertaken, and gives little indication of the employment pattern of the Indian Community as it exists to-day.

Correct. But this title is not important in staff at this stage

(8) Then, I do not think we should divide this Chapter into Primary, Secondary, and Tertiary Industries, to include the Public Service as a Tertiary Industry, and the Professions. The Professions and the Public Service should have separate chapters or sections.

(9) Section C entitled "Conclusions and Recommendations": There is a proposal to include ~~the~~ Chapter on the desirability of establishing a Separate University. This I take it would be written by the Rector or member of his staff and it could go in Section C.

Then I have before me a number of other manuscripts written by individual members of the staff: One on Vocational Guidance. Another on Business Management, some notes by Dr. A. L. Moolla on Indian Employers' attitudes, all of them intended as contributions to the Report. With respect, I suggest that some of these additional:

Vocational Guidance might come in in the concluding section (C), Mr. Moolla on section B & Business Management etc. in the relevant chapters.

(10) We need to decide in any case where such material is to be placed.

(11) More Generally, it is very important for us to collect in separate folders the material that is to go into each section and into each chapter. It ~~will~~^{would} be ^a comparatively simple matter to revise and recast editorially the Draft Report as it stands, but it is clear that the expansion demands that a final decision regarding chapter headings and chapter contents is required without delay. With respect, I point to the danger of overloading the Report with material to such an extent that the main Survey, the main problem, The Employment of Indian Graduates, takes a second place. However, no doubt that with care these things will eventually be accommodated.
