A week ago, I addressed a meeting in protest against the compartmentalisation and week ionalisation of culture; and teday I speak to you, who have vindicated my arguments of that day. Culture must be a medium of communication and the vehicle for the premetion of the message of understanding, telerance and guidance. No man or group can survive indefinitely in a vacuum or reach perfection, without having terrenced the conflicts of decision, conscience of guilt, or the turmoil of adaptation. It is easy to swim in the forceful current of conformity and compliance, but it is more fulfilling to have questioned and reached peace with oneself, accord with society and harmony with the environment. Many of us mistakenly believe that culture is strict and unchangeable - any adjustment, addition or deletion is sacriligious. This is not so. Whist it is valid that for culture to be progressive and achieve its intended results, it would be desasterous to change the basic moral values of behaviour and conduct, because this gives strength to the stability and security of society. It is an established fact that oulture is additive and pregressive - when people of different customs, traditions and standards live or meet in close assiciation, they are able to influence each other and aver a period of f he a distinctive pattern of existence is evelved. History has shown the influence of such deminant cultural periods - e.g. Reman, Greek, AND many others. However, it must net be construed that the cultural norms of demination are necessarily the superior values, because this superiority only manifests itself through some aspect of ats influence - military might, scientific superiority etc. Thus even the subjurged or supressed groups have virtues that are superior then the dominant group. This is one reason that despite its great material, scientific and technological advance, western culture has not adequately satisfied the needs of its society. The seeds of destruction lie > in its pre-scoupation with the material worth of human existence. Today we find western youth turning to the east; looking for escape from from its own soulless involvemont. Whilet in the east we find a struggle where it is finding it equally difficult to reach a balance with the tremendous progress of material advancement of the west. This constant search for balance create points of misunderstanding, suspicion and often conflicts. We must bear in mind that cultural development can only be benificial if we appent that it is not restrictive and demands improvement for its fullest petential. I is only unchangeable in those aspects of life that govern harmony between man and man, man and his environment; and man and himself. These are necessary principles that deter mines the orderly growth of society and regulates this advancement for the total good o society - this is self-evident in the teachings of most of the great religious and phil combine of life. When society fails in this direction then we have wars, revolutions, 🔆 Tive, to build bridges of contact, encourage sharing of ideas and arrange meet. tween people - such as this gathering te-night. Needless to stress that good understanding and healthy relationship must flow from such get-to-gethers and exchange of idea: This assembly epitemises the human need for dialogue; especially between people of diferent cultural backgrounds; and so make our positive centribution, towards the ideal social order, designed by Ged. As people we may differ in our approaches and attitudes but as people we have to seek the path that will translate into reality, what religion have preached, since the dawn of time. Many are afraid to communicate, for fear of con version, but society will be that reacher for having conversed. Man must be able to se t out from the past, those values that encourage security and stability; and discard that which is harmful and stultifies imprevements. Because what we consider necessary te-day will not necessarily be adequate, a hundered hears hence. Se a centinual presess of assessment is necessary. When Indians came to South-Africa they brought certain cultural characteristics which ever the years has undergone tremendous transfermation. Much of this change has been forced ente us through different environmental conditions pelitical inhibitions, industrial development and contact with different racial group: Thus our Indian culture is being replaced by a South-African culture. No amount of ep esition or resistance to adaptation can alter this fact. Provided we maintain the bas: maral values of ethics and code of conduct, this evolutionery process is definitely needed, if we are to live in peace and interdependance with all the South-African grops; and also for the proper and fruitful utilisation of the advantages for humanity a large. Balance is of prime requisite for success; and it is to this end we must work. Communion leads to the power to understand and the ability to appreciate differences in philosophy; and from this type of consultation and mutation of ideas can arise a ast order, far leftier then the existing climate of uncertainty, and rumblings that disciontent that clouds the world. There can be unity in diversity, just as there is harmony in diversity in nature. Reason and indulgence can only result from knowledge and participation; ignorance and prejudice will be accentuated through isolation and separation. This is a lesson which multiracial South-Africa must take to heart, if i is to avoid the pain and agony of conflicts and racial polarisation. Finally, a few words on poetry - poetry has the quality to excite, to elevate, to confuse, to understand, to love, to hate - all the emetions and characteristics that form part of the hiving force of man. It can be naive and simple; or philosophical and difficult. But in every aspect touches the higher sense of all of us. It expressess the spiritual va

Crippled as we are, under a system that encourages survival through separation and fear We have cultural moral values and spiritual responsibilities that cries out against the injustices that man perpertrates against his fellew men. If, in the poetry that you present to-day and the pearls of wisdom that you speak, can but re-emphasise the virtues which materialsim has destroyed in our soul; then you will have served a most use-1 service to us. In these dark days of uncertainty and indifference there is need for the voice of justice to preclaim its right over the selfish motives of men. Thus we humanch hope to learn much, value even more and practice charity, humility and service, which

no doubt you will stir in the hearts that are present here.
