on the 19/10. Thank you...

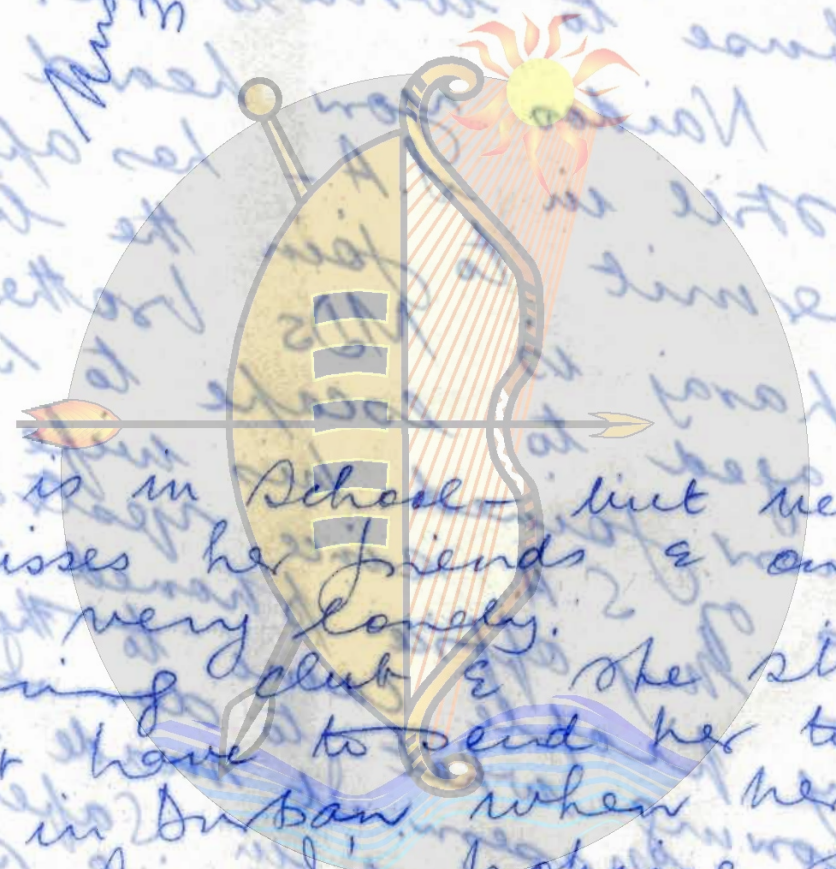
Sukhthi arrived in Lesotho a week ago
