Dear Sir,

I am anxious to learn how far you have progressed with the negotiations regarding cooperation between the African, Coloured and Indian people. You will doubtless agree that it is essential that this cooperation should be established if the non-European people in this country are to make an impact on South African politics.

You will also doubtless agree that unless this co-operation is established soon the people who are at present fiddling about with the wonderful ideal of the unity of the non-European people will create further confusion in the minds of our people and we are likely to be regarded as being against unity.

There is no doubt that we all believe in unity and would like to see unity established. All those who want to lead the people and want to retain their positions as leaders must make the position clear in this regard. It is therefore necessary that at the forthcoming conference of the African National Congress you should report what you have done in the matter.
