upset him. However, a
terrible case of depression
seemed to have come over him.
He lost all interest - not
wanting to listen to the news
or read the paper and refusing
to eat. The doctor said he is
convinced to be heard too much
and must get me now.
He has bronchial asthma,
& cannot walk any distance
but I ^{UKZN} ^{Gandhi Luthuli} ^{Documentation} ^{Centre} try to take him out
as much as possible, weather
permitting. I am only telling
you this for you to
understand why you have not
heard more from me. I
don't want to tell you my

problems as yours are
far worse. But please let me
know if I can help in any
way. I would think it
imperative to contact an
M.P. immediately, possibly
one who has experience of
dealing with this sort of thing.
