The leadership of the Unity Movement recognised the basic divisions in South African society as class divisions, and the fundamental struggle a class struggle which forms part of the struggle against capitalism as a world system.

The apartheid policy of national-racial oppression is itself an instrument for reinforcing class exploitation. The key to the whole approach to the liberatory struggle is the realisation that it is in the main the independent struggle of the oppressed workers and peasants that will liberate South Africa.

With its **ten point programme** and the policy of **non-collaboration** with the oppressor, it mobilised the population around the day-to-day struggles against land hunger, national oppression and exploitation in order to raise the level of political consciousness of the masses. It recognised that the problems of the oppressed could not be solved within the framework of the existing capitalist system.

In this situation it is the leadership of the vast army of migrant labourers in the conduct of the struggle for democratic rights that will ensure the continuity of the revolution right over to its socialist goal.

The only force that is committed to and capable of waging a consistent struggle for the liberation of the oppressed and exploited workers and peasants consists of that group of organisations united under the banner of the **Unity Movement of South Africa**.
