Application for Residence Permit

I attach applications for Residence Permits for me and my wife. Since my circumstances are somewhat unusual, a word of explanation is called for.

I am an Associate Professor at the University, where I have been teaching since 1937. The Minister of Justice has recently imposed certain prohibitions on me, which have the effect of preventing me from serving in this capacity for the next five years. I attach a copy of the Minister's notices.

I have consequently applied to the University for special leave of absence without pay, until the 30th November, 1969, when the notices are due to expire.

My wife and I wish to settle permanently in Zambia, where I hope to continue my academic researches and writing. I do not intend to seek employment. We can live on our accumulated capital until such time as my pension and gratuity from the University Provident Fund mature towards the end of 1967, or at my death if this event occurs before then.

My benefits from the Provident Fund on retirement at the age of 60 years will consist of a capital sum of £8368 and an annuity of £500.

My assets, apart from the Provident Fund benefits, amount to approximately £20,000, invested in fixed property, mortgage bonds, building society deposits, and union loan certificates.

South African Treasury Regulations allow us to take with us approximately half our capital if we emigrate. We propose to apply for permission to transfer £10,000 to Zambia, if we are given residential permits. The remainder will be available in South Africa to provide for the education of our children until they leave
